Role Title: CPAG Event Volunteer

Time commitment: Flexible, based on event schedules. Volunteers are asked to commit to attend Volunteer zoom induction and training session of 45 minutes each.

Role Description: We are seeking enthusiastic and dedicated individuals to join us as Event Volunteers to support our various initiatives and activities aimed at raising awareness and to combat child poverty.

Key Responsibilities:

- 1. Event Support:
 - Assist in the planning, coordination, and execution of CPAG events, including 2024 Child Poverty Conference, Post Budget Breakfast and AGM.
- 2. Logistics Assistance:
 - Support with logistical tasks, such as registration, distribution of materials, and coordination of volunteers during events.
 - Collaborate with the Event Coordinator to ensure smooth event flow and address any participant inquiries.

3. Promotional Activities:

- Assist in distributing promotional materials, including flyers, brochures, and merchandise, to maximize event visibility.
- Encourage social media sharing and engagement during events to amplify CPAG's message.
- 4. Data Collection:
 - Assist in collecting participant feedback and data during events.
 - Contribute to post-event reports and evaluations to help improve future initiatives.

- A strong commitment to eliminating child poverty in New Zealand, compatible with CPAG's mission.
- A commitment to Te Ao Maori and Te Reo.
- A high degree of personal integrity.

- Reliable and punctual with a positive and proactive attitude.
- Previous experience in event planning or volunteering is a plus but not required.
